

CCA at Forefront of Critical Legal Advocacy for Immigrant Children

There are growing numbers of undocumented immigrant children in Connecticut and CCA attorney Edwin Colon is an expert on the law that can help. Many children fled abuse and neglect and live in constant fear of being returned to life-threatening conditions. They arrive alone, without a parent or guardian. Education is hampered by trauma.



- Legal representation for children who qualify for Special Immigrant Juvenile Status
- Pro-bono training to provide free legal representation for undocumented children
- Improving school districts' practice and policies to protect immigrant children from increased ICE enforcement action
- Developing best practices model with Norwalk Public Schools to address unmet needs of immigrant and refugee children who experienced trauma and interrupted education
- Deploying our mobile legal office to migrant farm communities to provide education on legal rights
- Pursuing state legislative initiatives to protect undocumented children



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Center Trains Waterbury Police and Youth to Reduce Arrests

Funded by the Court Support Services Division of the Connecticut Judicial Department, CCA attorney Leon Smith and Hartford Retired Chief of Police Daryl Roberts led meetings between Waterbury youth and police.

The Center's Police-Youth trainings have taken place across the state. The recent day of workshops in Waterbury saw two groups that arrived with frustra-





tion and negative perceptions of each other, and finished with understanding and friendly interactions. Officers and youth trained on adolescent development and the impact of trauma on interactions and decision-making.

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Huge Systemic Win - Medical Transportation for Children who Rely on Medicaid



CCA Attorney Bonnie Roswig continues in her successful efforts to compel the state to address problems with medical transportation. Attorney Roswig's Complaint, filed with the Justice Department, resulted in new state policy that protects the health and safety of all children who rely on the state's non-emergency medical transportation.

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SpeakUp! Workshops Help Girls Find Strong Voices to Advocate for Themselves

As a result of a grant from the National Girls Initiative, through the CT Juvenile Justice Alliance, CCA Attorney Zoe Stout worked with a group facilitator to conduct eight weeks of workshops with girls at Connecticut Junior Republic (CJR), an after-school juvenile justice diversion program. The workshops teach girls to be strong advocates for themselves, develop a focus for their efforts and a strategy to meet their goals.

The girls focused on their school's discipline policy and met with Jackie Davis, Waterbury School's Director of School Based Diversion Initiatives, to advocate for specific changes.



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Important CCA Webinar on Trauma and Legal Dangers of Sexting

Like other online content, texts and images do not go away. There are legal consequences and youth are vulnerable. There is enormous trauma and long-term impact for adolescents whose privacy is violated.

The recent webinar reached a statewide audience of educators, lawyers, medical and mental health providers, parents, law enforcement and more.
